## Pope Francis - 2015 A Year of Consecrated Life

In November 2014, Pope Francis announced a special year-long focus on consecrated life, asking the Church's religious sisters, brothers and priests to "wake up the world" with their testimony of faith, holiness and hope.

The Year will take place in the context of the 50<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the Second Vatican Council which has been a breath of the Spirit for the church and for the religious life.

Spokesmen for the Vatican outlined three

objectives for the Year. First to "make a grateful rememberance of the recent past". The Council asked those consecrated to the religious life to renew their commitment of fidelity to the Lord, to the Church, to their own charism and to the people of today.

Building on this positive outlook on the past, the second objective calls for "embracing the future with hope". Although there are many challenges, men and women religious are encouraged to trust in the Lord

and remain full of hope.

The third objective urges religious to "live the present with passion" Let the beauty of following Christ shine through your vocation for all to see.


Using chalk, write on the outside of your house, above or next to an entrance:


## **BOOK REVIEW:** A Year With Pope Francis

We encourage our readers to reflect on the many ways these men and women have lived out their vocations and to pray for the orders they have founded.

# **JANUARY 2015**

#### St. Elizabeth Ann Seton:

Feast Day: January 4 - Patronage: Loss of Children Born: Aug. 28, 1774 in New York - Died: Jan. 4, 1821 Beatified in 1963 - Canonized on Sept. 14, 1975

Elizabeth Ann Seton, was very intelligent and cultured which was not common during her time. When she was 19 years old she was married to a wealthy man by the name of William Seton. They had five children. When there was a tuberculous outbreak, William Seton became victim to the illness and was in need of a Doctor. Together Elizabeth and William traveled to Italy to seek treatment however William died from the sickness. It was in Italy that Elizabeth, who was formerly Protestant, converted to the Catholic Faith. When she came back to America, she started her own order called The Sisters of Charity who wore the widow's cap and dress. Elizabeth would lose two children who also died of tuberculous. She was strong in faith and did not quit despite any difficulties. She died on January 4, 1821 due to tuberculous. Elizabeth Ann Seton is the first American who became a Saint in the Catholic Church. You can visit her tomb and a Shrine which is located in Emmetsburg Pennsylvania.

#### St. Andre Bessette:

Feast Day: January 6

Born: Aug. 10, 1845 - Died: Jan. 10, 1937

Beatified: May 23, 1982 - Canonized: Oct. 17, 2010

St. Andre Bessette was the 8<sup>th</sup> of 12 children. When he was of age he joined the Congregation of The Holy Cross but had to leave because of his poor health. However the Bishop, who must have seen his holiness forced the Congregation to allow him to stay, and had him become the door Keeper. Andre Bessette humbly accepted this position and enjoyed taking care of those who were sick. He always took comfort in St. Joseph, and eventually left the Congregation to start his own order, St. Joseph's Oratory in Montreal. Thousands of pilgrims would come to visit him and to receive the St. Joseph's Holy Oil which was known for its miraculous healings. He is the first Saint to be canonized in Montreal

<u>St. Francis de Sales:</u> Feast: Jan. 24 Patronage: Writers, Confessors, hearing impaired, writers, and educators

Birth: Aug. 28, 1567 - Death: Dec. 28, 1622

Beatified: Jan. 8, 1661 Canonized: April 8, 1665

St. Francis de Sales was born to a noble family in Haute Savoie France. He was the eldest of six children and therefore attended the best schools in order to prepare for his future career as a Magistrate. Once he heard a speech on the dangers of sin and hell, which made him ill and bed ridden. He conscerated his life to Mary and God and took a vow of Chasity. He later became a priest and because he was so influential in the year 1602, he became the Bishop of Geneva. Along with St. Jane Francis de Chantal they founded the women's "Order of the Visitation of Holy Mary". Francis de Sales also founded a small community of men titled "Oratory of St. Phillip Neri", which ended soon after his death. He was a very profound writer; much of his work is still read today especially "Introduction to the Devout Life" which was written especially for lay people.

**St. Angela Merici:** Feast Day: January 27
Patronage: Loss of parents, handicapped, & sickness Birth: March 21, 1474 - Died: January 27, 1540
Beatified: April 30, 1768 - Canonized: May 24, 1807

St. Angela Merici was born in Lombardy. When she was 15 years old, She and her older sister lost their parents and had to move in with their uncle. When Angela's older sister died suddenly without receiving her last rites, Angela became a Third Order Franciscan and prayed for her sister's soul. She then had a vision that her sister was in Heaven with the Saints. Angela was very beautiful and attracted a lot of admirers but she had promised her life to God. On November 25, 1535 Angela along with twelve other women started the Company of Saint Ursula, which is today known as the Ursuline Sisters. They goal was and still is today to educate and teach.

<u>St. John Bosco:</u> Feast: January 31
Patronage: Editors, publishers, school children, young people, magicians, and juvenile delinquents
Born: August 16, 1815 - Died: January 31, 1888
Beatified: June 2, 1929 - Canonized: April 1, 1934

St. John Bosco was born in Becchi Italy to a poor family who were farm hands. At the age of 2 John Bosco's father had died, leaving his wife to take care of the family. When John was 9, he had his first dream which would last the rest of his life. His dreams, which were life like, consisted of Mary, Heaven and hell. When he would wake up the next morning, he was actually exhausted. John wanted to become a priest, and at the age of 12 he left his home to study.

Because of their poverty they could not afford the education that was necessary. A priest named Fr. Joseph Cafesso saw the holiness in this boy and helped him. In the year 1835 John Bosco became a priest. Once while visiting a prison, he was sadden by the amount of young boys who were in jail and wanted to do all that he could to prevent this from happening. Therefore he started the "Oratory of St. Francis de Sales" which was created to teach trade, educate, and possibly create new vocations to the priesthood. Despite many difficulties St. John Bosco never gave up, and had faith that God would never abandon him.

# **FEBRUARY 2015**

#### St. Birgit of Ireland

Feast Day: February 1 Born: 453 - Died: 524 Patronage: Babies, blacksmiths, boatman, illegitimate children, dairy workers, and Ireland

St. Brigit was born into slavery in Ireland. She was baptized along with her mother, by St. Patrick. From her early youth she was devout and very holy. At a young age she entered into religious life and took the veil of St. Macaille. In 470 she founded the convent Cill-Dara (Kidare). This was the first convent in Ireland. There are many miracles that are attributed to St. Birgit. She was full of spirituality, compassion and love for those who were in need.

# The Seven Holy Founders of the Order of Servites Feast Day: February 24

In the year 1240, seven Florence men of nobility all decided to withdraw from their worldly lives and join together in solitude, where they could pray and be in direct service to God, without all the earthly distractions. Their goal was to lead a life of Penance and Prayer but due to the amounts of visitors they were receiving this made it difficult so they left Florence and went to the deserted land of Monte Senario.

# **MARCH 2015**

St. Katherine Drexel: Feast Day: March 3
Patronage: Philanthropy, Radical Justice
Born: Nov. 26, 1858 Died: March 3, 1955
Beatified: Nov. 20, 1988 Canonized: Oct. 1, 2000

St. Katherine Drexel was born to a wealthy family in Philadelphia. She along with her other two sisters were well educated. The parents also stressed the importance of taking care of the less fortunate. Once while visiting Pope Leo XIII, she asked if he could send missionaries into Wyoming for the Indians. His response to her was; "Why don't you become a missionary?" This was the start of her religious vocation. She gathered a few women together and started her own order, "Sisters of the Blessed Sacrament for Indians and Colored". Their goal was to

teach the Indians and the African Americans who were not treated well at that time, and to show that they cared for them and that God loves them. Katherine Drexel also started Xavier University. During her life she gave millions of dollars away to those who needed it most.

St. John of God: Feast Day: March 8
Patronage: Booksellers, hospitals, nurses, the mentally ill and the dying
Born: March 8, 1495 Died: March 8, 1550

Beatified: Sept. 21, 1603 Canonized: Oct. 16, 1609

St. John of God was born to an impoverished family in Portugal. However their faith and devotion of God was very strong. At a young age, St. John was kidnaped and taken to a foreign country. A kind man by the name of Francisco Mayoral took him into his home. In return St. John looked after his sheep and a shepherd. He began to lose his faith, however, he regained it when he heard St. John of Avila speak. St. John of God began to beat himself up and torture himself for ignoring God. St. John of Avila instructed him to stop what he was doing, and find another way to show God that he was sorry. John of God, started to care for the poor and the sick. Eventually, with a group of men who had the same wish, he started the "Order of Hospitallers"; later after his death it was called "Order of the Hospitalliers of St. John of God".

<u>St. Francis of Rome:</u> Feast Day: March 9
Patronage: Benedictine Oblates, Automobile drivers
Born: 1384 Died: March 9, 1440 Canonized:
1608

St. Francis of Rome was born to wealthy parents. At a young age she wanted to become a nun and give her life completely to God. Her parents however, objected and forced her into marriage. She was obedient and did what they asked of her. Once, when they had no wine or grain, St. Francis prayed and miraculously everything was replenished. Her husband then converted to the Catholic faith. St. Francis started a religious group of women, who were bond by no vows. All they were asked is to offer themselves to God and to assist the poor.

#### St. Pope Gregory the Great:

Feast Day: March 12 Patronage: Teachers Born: 540 Died: March 12. 604

Canonized: Soon after his death

St. Gregory the Great was appointed Chief Magistrate of Rome at the age of 34. During this time he built a total of 7 monasteries, one of them being in his own home. When he was 35, he became a priest. St. Gregory was elected Pope by a unanimous vote. During this time he contributed to the Liturgy of the Mass and the Office. He is a doctor of the church.
